1 p.m.– 2 p.m.

Author Maxine Carlson, Author of Bella Sophia the Pacific Coast Mermaid

Attendees can meet author Maxine Carlson and "Bella Sophia the Pacific Coast Mermaid" based on the book from Monterey Bay. Follow along as Bella Sophia, encouraged by a dynamic mermaid legend, blossoms with confidence and joy. This book will take you on a journey of a lifetime from the Pacific Coast of Monterey Bay (iconic Cannery Row) California, the Mediterranean Island of Sicily, Italy, and to the scenery of the mermaid cove of Tunisia, Africa. Pebble Beach author, Maxine Carlson, is also the author of The Wild Buck (Book 1 of the Huckleberry Hill Adventure Series).

2 p.m.– 3 p.m. Mike Ventimiglia, author of Italians of

the Monterey Peninsula. Since the early 1900s, Monterey was

known for its fishing, mostly for salmon and the abalone that was plentiful in Monterey Bay. The migration of the Sicilian Italian community is credited for reaping what was called the "Silver Harvest," the sardines of Monterey Bay. It is this author's attempt to capture the working class that made Monterey the "Sardine Capital of the World." The book boasts vintage images, many of which have never been published, and showcases memories of days gone by. Author Mike Ventimiglia's family and relatives fished, worked the canneries, operated, and owned fishing boats as well as a cannerv on Cannerv Row. He has spent hundreds of hours researching and obtaining photographs in an effort to preserve a small part of the families who worked and fished in Monterey.

3 p.m. – 4 p.m.

Author Tim Thomas, Author of The Abalone King of Monterey: 'Pop" Ernest Doelter

Tim Thomas, fourth-generation native of the Monterey area, is a speaker and tour guide. For 16 years, he was historian and curator for the Monterey Maritime & History Museum and has worked with the Monterey Bay Aquarium, California State Parks and the Monterev Bay National Marine Sanctuary, He is author of "The Abalone King of Monterey: 'Pop' Ernest Doelter," "The Japanese on the Monterey Peninsula" and coauthor of "Monterey's Waterfront." Tim also conducts monthly "Wharf Walks" on Monterey's Old Fisherman's Wharf, walking tours of the Lower Presidio Historic Park and offers Cannery Row walking tours, as well. Tim Thomas will bring copies of "The Abalone King of Monterey: 'Pop" Ernest Doelter." In 1908, "Pop" Ernest Doelter was crowned the Abalone King. In the kitchen of his Alvarado Street restaurant in Monterey, California, Pop transformed rubbery gastropods into an epicurean delight. Working with red abalone collected by Monterey's community of Japanese divers, Pop dipped the foot in egg wash, added a secret ingredient, rolled it in cracker crumbs and cooked it quickly in olive oil. Tourists and celebrities alike sat down at Pop's table to enjoy his famous recipe. and eventually, he shipped steaks on ice to hotels and restaurants throughout the state. Pull up a chair as historian Tim Thomas recounts the story of an innovative restaurateur and a group of pioneering fishermen who turned underappreciated mollusks into the talk of the 1915 San Francisco World's Fair.

4 p.m. – 5 p.m.

Author Barbara Siebeneick The Cardinal in The Crypt is Barbara Siebeneick's first mystery novel. She grew up in the Bay Area and lives on the Monterey Peninsula of California. Barbara spends much of her time as a docent at San Carlos Cathedral. Her degree in history from UCSB instilled in her a love of history that continues until today. What better place to write a murder/ mystery than the history rich city of Monterey, filled with stories of mystery, treasure, and even murder.

Recently shown in the HBO hit TV series, Big Easy Lies, Monterey's Old Fisherman's Wharf is open 365 days a year including during the holidays.

A visit to the Monterey Peninsula just isn't complete without a rendezvous with Old Fisherman's Wharf in downtown Monterey that was built in 1845 for regular passenger and freight service. Known as the "Monterey Bay Whale Watching Capital of the World<sup>™</sup>" and a top destination of visitors from around the world, Monterey's Old Fisherman's Wharf provides a wide array of awardwinning dining, shopping, special events, theatre, whale watching, bay cruises, a glass bottom boat, marine life, fishing and sailing, and strolling leisurely in a setting overlooking the Monterey Bay.

Situated near downtown Monterey, Old Fisherman's Wharf is conveniently located along the Monterey Bay Recreation Trail and has plenty of nearby parking. Anyone with Monterey County ID (939) can receive 2 hours of free parking in the Fisherman's Wharf parking lot Monday through Thursday.

Other upcoming Monterey's Old Fisherman's Wharf events include Halloween on the Wharf (Oct. 31), Christmas on the Wharf (1st three weekends in December, Dec. 6-22) and the 9th Annual Whalefest Monterey (Jan. 25-26).
