Whalefest Monterey

(Dana Wharf) Monterey has trademarked the title of "Whale Watching Capital of the World," and with good reason. This past year alone, visitors have had the chance to view hundreds of whales, orcas, dolphins and pelicans as they feast on a krill and anchovy "buffet" in the Monterey Bay. The 2015 Whalefest on Old Fisherman's Wharf later this month will be the fifth annual event. The two-day fest highlights community conservation efforts and awareness of the Monterey Bay National Marine Sanctuary with lectures and documentaries on ocean and marine life, a 60-foot model of a gray whale that visitors can climb inside, live music and whale-watching tours, weather permitting.

Dana Point Festival of Whales

By March, the gray whales will be headed to Baja, and hundreds of the 35-ton leviathans will splash through the waves near the seaside community of Dana Point, just south of Laguna Beach between Los Angeles and San Diego. The 44th annual Dana Point event includes an opening day parade and family-friendly street fair, a Polynesian cultural event, sand sculpting, concerts on land and water and, of course, whale-watching excursions from Dana Point Headlands Conservation Park. Unique shops fill Mariners Village, and miles of trails rim the cliffs that overlook the 2,500-slip yacht harbor.

Mendocino Whale Festival

The Mendocino coast offers four whale festivals each year. The first is at Mendocino Headlands State Park, a prime spot for whale viewing. The festival includes a wildlife art exhibit, plein-air artist displays and chowder tastings -- and a chance to explore the beautiful village of Mendocino itself.

Point Cabrillo Light Station Whale Festival

This light station was established in 1909 on a point where the light would be the most visible to ships off the hazardous coast of Mendocino. This same attribute makes it a perfect spot from which to watch the annual migration of gray whales. The 1st Assistant Lightkeeper's House, now a museum, will be open for docent-led tours depicting the lonely lives of lightkeepers and their families in the 1930s. Weather permitting, docents also will lead walks to nearby Frolic Cove and relate the story of the clipper brig, Frolic, which wrecked off the cove in 1850. Little River Whale Festival

A fundraiser to save the Spring Ranch barns, the annual Little River Whale Festival -- two miles south of the town of Mendocino -- offers food, wine and art tours, plus lodging specials.

Whale of a Day

Rancho Palos Verdes in Los Angeles County holds its annual Whale of a Day celebration on the main grounds of the Point Vicente Interpretive Center. Along with face painting, exhibits, children's crafts, chalk drawing and story telling, tours of the Point Vicente Lighthouse will be available for ages 7 and older. The surrounding area offers walks along the California Coastal Trail, and visits to Abalone Cove Shoreline Park, which features two beaches, tide pools, bluff-top viewing areas and trails.
